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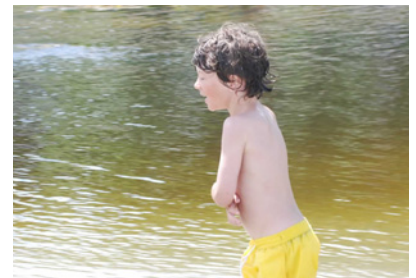
President's Letter

2011 Season Preview

Program Overview

We're continually working to improve the SPSS experience for all ages, maintaining our fun and informal atmosphere while attempting to keep things as simple and flexible as possible.

Our focus for 2011 will be on greater program integration as we try to ensure that Summer School provides all of its students - whatever their ages or interests, whenever and for however long they participate - with a memorable and "uniquely Small Point" experience. Toward that end we've introduced some new features, simplified the schedule, and added an option for campers who elect to do both morning and afternoon programs to stay at the Summer School for lunch. So here's how it all shakes out:



Beginning Tennis

Our camp day will start as usual with 45 minutes of tennis instruction for kids aged 4 to 7 who are just learning to play the game. Beginning Tennis will meet from 8:15AM until 9:00AM on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

Explorers

The Explorers program for kids aged 4 to 7 will meet on Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings from 9:00AM until 12:00PM. Explorers will now include a day of introductory sailing each week, to enable all campers to experience this vital part of Small Point's summer culture.

Adventurers

This revamped program for kids aged 8 to 14 will integrate Arts & Nature with Tennis and Games, so that children can engage in a variety of activities every week, including tennis, games, arts and crafts, and nature adventures. Adventurers will meet on Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings from 9:00AM until 12:00PM. (We also hope to be able to offer limited morning sailing, and for campers who'd like three mornings of tennis, match play tennis on Tuesday mornings.)

Sailing and Water Sports

While this will still be primarily an introductory sailing class, we will also be incorporating other fun aquatic activities like lobstering, kayaking and tubing. Sailing and Water Sports meets Mondays, Tuesdays and Fridays from 1:00PM until 4:00PM and is open to campers aged 8 and older.

420 Class Sailing

For sailors looking to sharpen their skills with a bit more focus on competition, we will be offering an in-depth program geared toward racing and participation in two regional regattas. 420 Class Sailing is open to campers aged 10 and older with previous sailing experience. It meets Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 1:00PM until 4:00PM. (Note: We are actively seeking a volunteer adult who would be willing to serve as regatta coordinator. Please contact us directly if you might be interested.)

Navigators

Coming off its hugely successful first year, Navigators (for campers aged 13 and up) will be enhanced through the addition of afternoon tennis instruction as well as expanded sailing and water sports activities. Navigators meets

Mondays, Tuesdays and Fridays from 1:00PM until 4:00PM.

Counselors-in-Training

Would you like to join the Summer School team? If you are entering 10th grade in the fall and are interested in being part of our CIT program, please email Ben and John at <smallpointsummerschool@gmail.com>. CIT's will work with directors and counselors to help plan, organize and run morning programs. Minimum time commitment is one month. (Note: The CIT program will not conflict with the schedule for our Navigators program, and we are strongly encouraging all CIT's to actively participate in Navigators.)

Thursday Programs

Thursday Programs this summer will include plenty of old favorites — trips to the Basin and Seguin; beach days and campouts; schooner cruises — as well as some surprises. Details will be posted on the website and at registration at the start of each week. Ages 6 and older, depending on type of program.

Auditions will be held on July 31 and August 1. To prepare, aspiring thespians aged 11 and older should review the Julie Andrews production of *Cinderella* (YouTube video) or rent the movie (available from Netflix) and learn the songs. **Casting preference will be given**

to those already familiar with the music!

Evening rehearsals will be held Sunday through Friday, with additional times (including during the day) for leading roles. You will not be called for rehearsals unless your scene or scenes are actually going to be rehearsed. Debba will be sending out requests for costume items later in the spring.

In an innovative stroke, this year's July production for younger children will feature selected songs and scenes from *Cinderella*, performed informally on July 30 and subsequently incorporated into the August performances (for those able to participate.) Children aged 5 and up are invited to rehearse. Auditions are not required for the July play.
